News Highlights 2nd Technology Transfer Symposium a Success

The Second International Transportation Technology Transfer Symposium took place in St. Petersburg, Florida, between 31 July and 3 August 2006.

The objective of the program was to create a forum for worldwide technology transfer professionals to learn, share and build upon innovative, efficient and sustainable transportation technology transfer methods with a focus on particular technology transfer techniques and workforce development programmes.

More than 350 transportation professionals representing leading US transportation organizations and 18 foreign countries participated. The program included three key plenary sessions and more than 40 concurrent sessions and organisation meetings within the five theme tracks of Communications, Program Effectiveness, Research and Development, Training, and Workforce Development.

In addition, a number of day-long events were conducted onsite during the weekend before the Symposium, including LTAP 101, an orientation to the Local and Tribal Technical Assistance Program, and the Road Safety Workshop, a workshop focusing on the new technologies, approaches, and legislative initiatives to transfer road safety technologies to state and local governments. A highlight of the program was the participation of the Iraqi Minister of Construction and Housing, Ms. Beyan Ismail Dezai Mohammed, who is also responsible for the Iraq highway program.


The Mondialogo Engineering Award

The Mondialogo Partnership, initiated by DaimlerChrysler and UNESCO to promote intercultural dialogue among young people around the world, is inviting student engineers, in developing and developed countries, to enter its second annual engineering award competition. Students are invited to form teams and to develop ideas and solutions in the form of project proposals that demonstrate excellence in design and cooperation in the application of engineering to address the United Nations Millennium Development Goals.

In its first round (2004/2005), 1,700 student engineers from 79 countries worked in over 100 teams to create project proposals designed to address basic needs in developing countries. In May 2005 twenty-one winning teams were invited to Berlin to a symposium and the presentation of a total of €300,000 in awards.
